Points to Remember

HS Directory slimmed down this year. DOE has continued to develop its online myschools tool. Applications can be done online through myschools, or by handing in a form to your guidance counselor

Specialized Schools (no state action on mayor's proposal, active lawsuit regarding Discovery program)

Diversity

Diversity in Admissions Pilots (not released yet, watch for list late summer)

Screened & Audition Admission Methods

Understanding requirements (Sometimes due before DOE application deadline—December 2)

District 2 Priority

Be realistic about the numbers (look at how many seats were filled with the priority group)
Millennium (this year 95% seats went to the SOHO priority group)

Diversity in Admissions Pilots

- High schools that are participating in the diversity initiative will give a
 certain percentage of applicants in the incoming ninth and tenth grades an
 admissions priority. Applicants who qualify as economically disadvantaged,
 based on federal income guidelines, will have this priority.
- For example, in the 2018-2019 cycle, **Manhattan / Hunter Science High School** (03M541) extended Priority admission to applicants eligible for Free or Reduced Price Lunch (based on family income) for up to 69% of seats.
- School principals work with the DOE Enrollment office to voluntarily decide on goals for diversity pilots.

Try to be flexible when considering schools

- Some start to narrow options too early
 - Pick specific admissions method, such as
 - Screened Only ... or ...
 - only pick schools of certain academic level ...
 - or other make-or-break criteria
 - can miss schools that may be a great option for student ... (ex: Harvest Collegiate, University Neighborhood School, Essex)
 - many vie for a short list of competitive schools
- Cast a wide net on general categories such as academic interests,
 - No other school system seems to offer the sheer breadth and depth of opportunities for students as New York City public high schools
 - Once you have broad group, then narrow down
 - You may be "surprised" Ex: Manhattan/Hunter & Art and Design

Students take classes at various CUNY campuses as part of junior and/or senior year. Examples: Frank McCourt, University Neighborhood High School http://www2.cuny.edu/academics/school-college-partnerships/college-now/

Also ... Ask how school supports college search – college office, tours

Performance Assessment Schools

- Instead of <u>most</u> of the Regents exams, take an alternate form of assessment
 - In all schools, still take at least one Regents, usually ELA

Arts Endorsement

- Along with requirements for high school diploma, also take additional credits and assessments in Dance, Theater, Music or Visual Arts
 - Some of programs also offer CTE certification
 - For commercial arts, maybe look at animation, illustration, graphic design, architecture, photography, film, video, fashion design, cartooning, digital media

CTE Endorsement

- CTE = Career and Technical Education
- Focus on specialty area matching/exceeding industry expectations and direct experience such as internships
- Some schools offer "some" CTE courses, such as LaGuardia, Brooklyn Tech, and Talent Unlimited
- CTE <u>Schools</u> require all students to participate in a CTE program

Who qualifies for GE seats and SWD seats:

Seats for General Education (GE) Students: Available for all students and those that receive less than 20% special education services on their IEP.

Seats for Students with Disabilities (SWD): Available for students who receive 20% or more special education services on their IEP.

The DOE Student Information System will calculate whether your child is eligible for an SWD seat, but you should be in the know as to whether they qualify and why.

What counts towards the 20%?

Integrated Co-Teaching (ICT)
Special Education Classes (Self-Contained)
Special Education Teacher Support Services (SETSS)

What does not count toward the 20%?

Speech Therapy, Occupational Therapy, Counseling, Physical Therapy

Includenyc.org offers guidance to parents of students with IEPs

Examples: SWD seats vs GE seats

- Maria is in a special class setting for a combined 20 periods per week:
- 20/35=57%
- Maria's application will count towards SWD seats

- William receives SETSS once a day for 5 total periods per week:
- 5/35=14%
- William's application will not count towards SWD seats because he is below the 20% rule. He would be eligible for GE seats.
